


Western Australian

Industry Report





INDUSTRY PROFILE

A recent Royal Life Saving Society Australia & PwC Report¹ estimated the economic, health and social impact of the aquatic recreation industry across Australia totalled \$9.1 billion.



This report extends on this national research and seeks to summarise the state of the industry in Western Australian for the year 2021-2022.

The key objectives of the report are to:

- 1. Calculate the quantify key outputs as an evidence base for advocacy and future investment,
- 2. Inform workforce planning and development,
- 3. Provide an insight into patron incidents and injuries,
- 4. Report on compliance to industry benchmarks and standard operating procedures,
- 5. Be a catalyst for discussion and the development of a strong, sustainable and responsive aquatic recreation industry.

The Royal Life Saving Society WA and Leisure Institute of WA Aquatics have collaborated for 16 years on this unique annual research project. We thank the public aquatic centres across the state who provided data as well as key information from the Water Corporation, Austswim, and Swim Coaches and Teachers Australia.









There are 129 public aquatic recreation facilities across Western Australia with 30 in the metropolitan areas and 99 in regional, rural and remote communities.

The vast geographical spread creates issues pertaining to the planning and operating of aquatic recreation centres. These include, but not limited to:

- The attraction of suitably qualified and experienced staff.
- The provision of suitable housing for staff in regional and remote areas.
- The appropriate level of remuneration of these staff.
 If the aquatic centre is to fulfill it's potential
 (appropriate planning and programming) in acting as a community hub for all cohorts of the population, staff need to be well qualified and experienced.
- The maintenance costs due to many being in rural and remote areas of the state.
- To be fit for purpose, the cost of refurbishment / replacement is daunting for many centres and at times beyond the capacity of a local government.









- > 3 x CPR performed.
- > 157 x oxygen administered.

Safety Assessments

- > 26 x total
- > 8 x metropolitan
- > 18 x regional/rural
- > 12 seasonal pools
- > 14 x all year pools.

Royal Life Saving collaborates with the Local Government Insurance Service (LGIS) to provide an independent safety assessment of public aquatic recreation centres. All pools in WA are assessed at least once every four years.

Safety Improvement

- > 184 x items for improvement were identified.
- > 72 x items were rectified via support/expertise from Royal Life Saving.
- > Remaining items being rectified by the individual centre.
- > All participating facilities are provided a 12-month subscription to the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operation.





The Social Return on Investment of Structured Sports Participation in Western Australia seeks to measure the economic and social benefits realised from organised, club-based sports across the State. The study is based on an established "SROI" methodology, which links verifiable benefits and costs associated with club-based sport to individuals, clubs and State Sporting Associations. This does not include unstructured play, participation programs, or general health & fitness activities.

This report provides a summary of the results of the study for aquatic sports, one of the sports (through each of the aquatic State Sporting Associations) which was integral to the development of the SROI framework and the associated inputs and assumptions required to facilitate the modelling.

Appendix 2: Reported energy efficiency upgrades in 2021/22

- > Bio Fuels system and Solar power
- > Solar expansion project to 550Kw generating capacity. BMS efficiencies to reduce gas consumption by utilizing geothermal heating in more situations where it was able to meet demand.
- > "Plant room control upgrade, pump replacements, VSD installation, solar panel instalment, heat pumps coming"
- > Installed VSD, LED lights above the 25m pool, new LED lights above the wave pool
- > "LED lighting, Water wise accreditation, during refurbishment backwash water reuse system was installed. Backwash water is UV filtered and pumped from a holding tank to a retic tank for use on pool grounds"
- Solar pool heating
- > Solar renewal lighting/heating automatic schedule
- > Installation of water usage metering on all pools to assisting monitoring for leaks, LED Lighting conversion full centre, Upgrades to circulation pumps with VSD's for improved energy efficiency

- > Facility was granted a renewable energy grant and has installed a roof with solar panels
- > Solar panels installed
- > Geothermal 25m & 50m pools Heat pump - 25m & 50m pools
- > Gas packs 25m & 50m pools
- > Install smart metres for energy consumption, review of pool solar heating system, engas refrigerant of cafe equipment
- > Solar panels installed
- > Installation of push buttons on showers
- > Geothermal Solar for power Generator-Welfare centre
- > Install solar panels to offset energy expense

Wellness area- spa and sauna.
